Advocacy Bingo is a fun and engaging way to help students learn and engage with important advocacy related concepts such as kindness. respect. and goal-setting. This game encourages students to understand and practice these values through interactive play. These cards can be used in a large group setting for a classroom game or during small-group instruction.

Instructions:

- 1. Explain the purpose of the game to the students: "Today we're going to play Bingo with words that represent important values and actions in our community. As we learn about these words, you will mark them on your bingo card."
- 2. Show students the Bingo card layout. Each card has a grid with a mix of advocacy related words and a center "Free Space." Explain that the goal is to mark off words on their card as they are called out and discussed.
- 3. Randomly call out & discuss the advocacy related words from your list. For each word, provide a brief explanation or example to help students understand its meaning and importance.
- 4. Students will mark the word on their bingo card if they have it. You can choose to call out words in any order or randomly to keep the game dynamic.
- 5. The first student to complete a row. column. or diagonal on their card and shouts "Bingo!" wins.

Additional Tips:

- Engage Students: Encourage students to ask questions and share their own experiences related to the words on their Bingo cards.
- Make It Fun: Keep the atmosphere lively and positive to ensure students remain engaged and interested.
- Reinforce Learning: Use the Bingo game as a springboard for further discussions or activities related to advocacy and social responsibility.

ADVOCACY BINGO DEFINITIONS

Advocacy: Speaking up for something you believe in or helping others get what they need.

Acceptance: Being okay with people being different from you and treating everyone kindly.

Accountability: Taking responsibility for your actions and making sure you follow through on promises.

Active Listening: Paying attention when someone is talking and showing you understand by asking questions or repeating what they said.

Assertiveness: Expressing your thoughts and feelings clearly and respectfully.

Awareness: Noticing and understanding what's happening around you, including other people's feelings.

Bravery: Facing fears or doing something even when it's scary.

Compassion: Caring about other people's feelings & wanting to help them when they're upset or in trouble.

Communication: Sharing your thoughts & feelings with others, and understanding what they are saying.

Conflict Resolution: Finding a peaceful way to solve disagreements between people.

Confidence: Believing in yourself and your abilities, and feeling sure that you can do things well.

Courage: Being strong even when you're afraid or facing something tough.

Determination: Sticking with something and not giving up, even if it's hard.

Empathy: Understanding and sharing how someone else is feeling.

ADVOCACY BINGO DEFINITIONS

Empowerment: Feeling like you have the ability and confidence to make decisions and take action.

Goal-Setting: Deciding what you want to achieve and making a plan to reach it.

Growth: Learning new things and getting better at what you do over time.

Honesty: Telling the truth and being sincere in what you say and do.

Independence: Doing things on your own and making your own choices.

Kindness: Being friendly, caring, and helpful to others.

Leadership: Guiding and inspiring others to work together and achieve something.

Mindfulness: Paying attention to the present moment and being aware of your thoughts and feelings.

<u>Positive Self-Talk:</u> Speaking to yourself in a kind and encouraging way, especially when facing challenges.

<u>Problem-Solving:</u> Finding solutions to difficulties or challenges.

Reflection: Thinking about what happened, what you did, and what you could do differently next time.

Respect: Treating others and their belongings with care and consideration.

Responsibility: Taking care of your duties and being dependable.

Resilience: Bouncing back from difficulties and continuing to try, even after setbacks.

Solution: The answer to a problem or the way to fix something.

Support: Helping and encouraging others when they need it.
